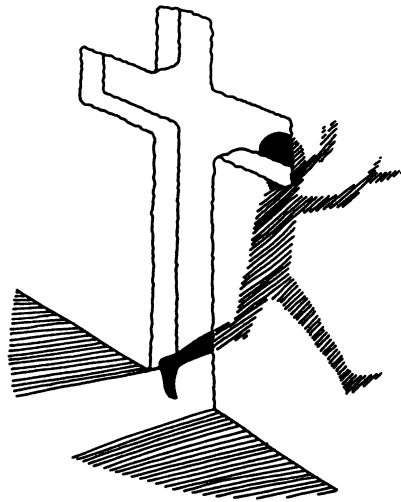

## The Klong Lan Report

**T**he last of the \$6,000 Associates contributed on the Launch Day of the Klong Lan Project last year has now been sent to Thailand.

The money has been used very carefully with the majority going to provide for the educational needs of uniforms and books which the children require for school. Some money has been used to support the community. Also when it was realised that one of the villages which the Sisters visit had no water, it was decided to provide money to construct a well. This will be done when the weather is right. So far the Project has been developing well and at present the Sisters at Klong Lan are planning what further educational requirements they will need to provide in the future.

Thanks must go to all those who have contributed. Together with some special larger donations, those Associates who have deposited regular amounts directly into the bank account have kept the balance growing throughout the year. This is greatly appreciated.

We Associates, should be proud of what has been accomplished with our contributions. By the time of the Klong Lan Meeting on 30 October 2011, the results of the future planning the Sisters have done should be available for us. The Committee really hopes you will come along to the meeting and hear what the future holds, and of course share a cup of tea and a chat with the Sisters. We also hope you will be inspired to continue your support for the Project.

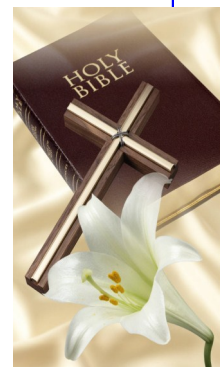

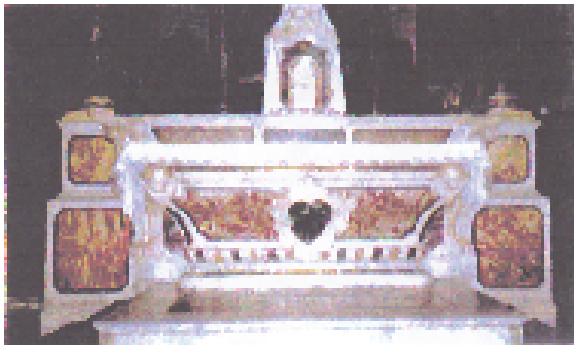

## **Emilie's Vision In the Church** **From EMILIE DE VIALAR FOUNDRRESS**

I felt an attraction to prayer and I would retire several times a day to my room in order to pray. This spirit of piety which it pleased Almighty God to foster in my soul made me avoid anything which would prevent me from assisting at Holy Mass daily. When at all possible, I also used to visit the church in the evening; and as my father did not like to see me going to church twice in the day, I slipped away unknown to him to spend a few moments in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. One on such occasion it pleased God to favour me with a great grace.

During a visit to the Blessed Sacrament one afternoon between three and four o'clock I was alone in the church, praying fervently. I had, I think, my head slightly inclined in recollection. Suddenly I saw Jesus Christ in the tabernacle. He was lying with His head resting on the Gospel side and His feet on the Epistle side. The Saviour's arms were in the form of a cross. I could clearly distinguish His hair which fell on His neck and shoulders. A shadow concealed part of His sacred Body, but His torso, His arms and feet were visible whether to the eyes of my soul or body, I don't know which, but as clear to me as a person standing before me. What caught my attention most, was the five wounds, which I discerned quite clearly, especially that of the right side. As I gazed, there appeared a few drops of blood oozing forth. I was struck by the fact that this adorable wound was not on the left as I had previously believed. This vision of Jesus Christ lasted for a short time, but I have no clear idea about its duration.

*This vision with which Emilie was favoured at St Peter's Church, marked her spiritual life. For her, the accent is placed on the love of Jesus for humanity. Jesus did not love us just with words; He accepted to shed His blood, to die for us. Even if we are not called to shed our blood, we need to enter in this movement of love, not merely with words and sentiments, but with acts of love - small or big actions....*

*In the Rule drawn up by Emilie and given to her Sisters, after the foundation of the Congregation, in part of the commentary on "Works Of Charity" it states,*

*" They (the Sisters) will dwell frequently on the adorable wounds of the Saviour, so that, reflecting unceasingly on the love of God for humanity they will maintain and increase each day, the sentiments of compassion and zeal....." ..*

## ***A Sad Farewell to the Finest of Ladies – Lena Strangio***

It is with the deepest sadness that I write about the passing of Angelina (Lena) Strangio (nee Ruggera) in Melbourne on 25 June 2011.

Lena was the finest of friends to me over many years and I miss her dreadfully. But I am not alone. There are so many others who also miss her because she had a unique capacity to enrich the lives of others by her kindness and wisdom, and by her extraordinary capacity to accept the hardships of life, just as she accepted the joys.

Lena saw good everywhere and in everyone. By her positive outlook - even in her hardest moments when she was so ill – she still managed to lift the spirit of all who knew her.

Lena and I both went to St Joseph's in Fremantle. But I was some years older and so did not know her until a chance meeting many years later at an Associates gathering in Melbourne where we discovered we were actually neighbours! Lena and her husband Vince ran my local pharmacy in Fairfield. Lena worked alongside Vince in the pharmacy, where she was well known for her warmth and attention to all customers. I had been going to their pharmacy for years but never realised the connection I had with Lena. So after that first meeting we became the greatest of friends.

Lena was an elegant, warm and friendly lady who cared deeply for others. She was devoted to her husband, Vince and to their son Lawrence, who is a well know playwright in Melbourne, daughter-in-law Pam, and their beautiful grandchildren - Oscar, Felix and Milo. Lena had a wide range of interests, from music to theatre to literature and in later life, she completed a Bachelor of Arts at La Trobe University. Lena loved helping with the Associates meetings in Victoria where we enjoyed meeting the nuns when they came to Melbourne every year. We loved hearing the news of the Sisters and of their achievements in France and all over the world.

When my husband Ted fell ill, Lena and Vince were the most constant of friends. Lena would call by and leave beautiful messages and flowers. I will never forget how she supported me and how caring she was. And then Lena herself became ill, there was so little we could do. She coped with her illness with great dignity and remained focused on supporting her friends and family. She never complained and remained positive to the end, still hoping her treatment would succeed, but God needed her more. Lena had the greatest of faith and was an inspiration to us all. Lena's sister Mary spent the latter part of her illness with her which was a great comfort to both Lena and to Vince over those final weeks.

We miss her so much.
